July marks a new fiscal year. I know you are busy deciding on a new budget and what works out best for your club. I am challenging everyone to participate in White Cane Day collections for District 12N. I considerate it to be a worthy and just cause. But what is the meaning of the white cane?

The white cane was created by a man named James Biggs in 1921 over in Bristol, England. Following an unfortunate accident, he became blind. He was walking around and felt uncomfortable due to the amount of traffic. So, he produced an idea of painting his walking stick white to be more visible.

Later in 1930, George Bonham, President of the Peoria, Illinois Lions Club produced an idea of using a white cane with a red stripe. The sole purpose was to assist the blind and help them become more independent. The Peoria Lions Club approved the idea, the white canes were made and handed over, and the Peoria City Council adopted a new ordinance giving anybody with a white cane right-of-way to cross the street.

As a result, Lions Clubs have a White Cane Day every year to help raise awareness for individuals who are blind. District 12N Lions raise funds that support causes like Childhood Cancer or Diabetes awareness, The East Tennessee Eye Bank, Lions Volunteer Blind Industries, Leader Dogs for The Blind, Tennessee School for The Deaf, Tennessee School for The Blind, just to name a few.


