
District 12N Charities Board of Directors Openings

AROUND THE DISTRICT

SMOKEY MOUNTAIN LION CHARITIES MOBILE VISION VAN, INC

Smoky Mountain Lions Charities, Inc (SMLC) was formed in 2005 to allow donations from the public to be tax deductible solely for charitable purposes including meeting the needs of disadvantaged individuals.

In 2011 Remote Area Medical (RAM) decided to retire their "Eye Wagon". It was suggested that we request them to donate it to the Lions. After considerable discussions a group of us decided that it had some potential. We asked the SMLC board of directors to pursue this opportunity. RAM agreed to donate the "Eye Wagon" to us. With that and a \$39,000 grant from the East Tennessee Lions Eye Bank we took ownership of the "Eye Wagon" on December 11, 2011.

A group of Lions and non-Lions spent hundreds of hours renovating the "Eye Wagon" and in the process renamed it the "Mobile Vision Lab".

On June 26, 2013 we had our first test run with patients. It was a complete failure. We had the glasses made by an outside lab for the patients. On August 21, 2013 **SUCCESS** on our second test run. But, we still were not comfortable so we had a third test run on September 28, 2013, success again. We then moved on to our first mission at the Fountain City Lions Club House on October 23, 2013 where we had 40 clients, made 27 pairs of eyeglasses that day. We had to order lenses for another 19 pair.

Since that time we have done 99 Missions: 79 at Fountain City Lions Club House; 1 at Love Tower, Knoxville; 2 at Clinton Towers, Clinton; 1 at Northgate Terrace Manor, Knoxville; 1 at Powell Presbyterian Church, Powell; 1 at Norris First Baptist Church, (Norris Middle School) Norris; 1 at St Johns Cathedral, Knoxville; 1 at Isabella Towers, Knoxville; 1 at 4th Presbyterian Church, Knoxville; 1 For fire victims at Boyd's Bear Barn, Pigeon Forge; 2 for fire victims at First Baptist Church, Gatlinburg; 1 at Green Magnet School, Knoxville, sponsored by St John's Cathedral; (con't

2 at First Baptist Church, Sevierville, sponsored by Sevier County Lions Club; 2 at New Horizon Baptist Church, LaFollette, sponsored by Campbell County Lions Club; 2 at Sarah Moore Greene Magnet Academy, one each sponsored by Knoxville East Lions Club and SMLC; 1 at Maynardville High School, Maynardville, sponsored by Union County Lions Club. The numbers served at any given mission ranged from 6 to 144.

On Wednesday, October 21, 2020 we completed our 100th mission. I'm not sure that we ever thought that we would be around that long especially at the Lions function where the idea was born in the spring of 2010. We definitely, or least I, could not envision that we would provide 6,119 pair of eyeglasses and 4156 eye exams all free to the patient with the exception of a few small co-pays.

We did this with an all volunteer crew who spent in excess of 15,300 hours in doing so. The value of services performed is estimated to be \$1,141,000. The volunteers came from Campbell Co, Clinton, Dandridge, East Tennessee St University, Farragut, Fountain City, Halls, Inskip, Karns, Knoxville East, Kingston, Knox North, Knoxville Diversified (formally Knoxville Downtown), Knox-Vol Campus, Knoxville Tri County, Loudon, Maryville, Morristown, Norris, Powell, Rutledge, Sevier County, So Knoxville, Union County and West Knox Lions Clubs. In addition to the Lion Volunteers we had 38 local professionals (MD's, OD's Technicians Opticians, etc), 169 general volunteers and 15 students/staff from the Kentucky School of Optometry.





Lions Volunteer Blind Industries

Since June 4, 2012, Lions Volunteer Blind Industries, Inc. has maintained an Annual Employment Scholarship Giving Program: called: **PROJECT PAYCHECK.**

While many of our blind workers meet or exceed expected job standards, there are others who strive daily to meet those goals in spite of disabilities. LVBI's "Project Paycheck" giving program helps those workers through an Employment Scholarship, which pays each worker A competitive wage as they learn to earn.

Lions Volunteer Blind Industries must remain competitive in the market place. However, we have accepted the added challenge of providing equality in employment opportunities for our blind citizens.

The cost of the Employment Scholarship program continues to rise. The cost of supporting this program is \$300,000. - \$500,000, depending on levels of blind employment. Approximately 25% annually coming from sponsoring Lions Clubs and the balance of donations and our own operating income.




