Lions Help Students Learn—Learning Ally

Somewhere in East Tennessee, a student is struggling to learn. If you want to succeed anywhere in life, the secret is a good education. But not everybody has the same capability of learning. There has to be a way to give that student a fighting chance. Within District 12-N Charities, the Lions club has such a program. This program is called Learning Ally.

Learning Ally provides educational help to students and communities in areas of Upper East Tennessee. These services have reached 83 new schools which have been introduced to this technology. A new program was introduced this year called Excite Reading. It is an early literacy program that gives support to both educators and students from kindergarten to second grade.

Struggling readers that do have access to Learning Ally can benefit by having access to over 80,000 audiobooks and textbooks, quarterly reading challenges, carefully designed lessons to help build vocabulary and family connections to further learning at home.

The audiobook solution is an added tool that helps teachers transform the students into avid learners. The teachers have the ability to track and analyze the overall learning as the student progresses. This is backed up by giving the teachers the opportunity to get the most out of the Learning Ally services.



PREVENT DIABETES - PREVENT BLINDNESS

Type 2 Diabetes is the leading cause of Blindness. The Good News: *PreDiabetes* is **reversible**. That's why the District 12N Project for the Core area of Diabetes focused on expanding *PreDiabetes* screening in Clubs' respective service areas. Starting in October, and peaking around worldwide Diabetes Awareness Day in November, seven clubs conducted screenings. Here are the results:

Screening for PreDiabetes

12N Diabetes Core Project

7 Clubs screened. Tellico Village continued their monthly glucose testing. Loudon, Sevier County, Maryville, Farragut, Greenville and Kingsport used the one-page ADA risk test, and Lions who had taken the *Lifestyle Change Course* told those "at risk" about the class. For people that left their contact information, the Clubs will let them know when new classes begin.

273 people saw the ADA Risk Test

47 provided contact information

Lions facilitated the start of 2 classes in January 2023, both allowing Virtual connection



Proposed Administrative Changes Charities Projects

At the December 5th meeting of the 12N Charities Board, two administrative changes to the names of Charities Projects were approved for presentation to the membership at the District 12N Convention on March 18, 2023.

Article VIII Charities Projects and Grants - Section 3 Designated Charities and Projects

Subparagraph 5)

Tennessee Lions Charities (Tennessee School for the Blind Fund)

Subparagraph 6)

Parent Teacher Counselor Association of Tennessee School for the Deaf

These changes are made to specify that the funds are designated for the sole benefit of the students.

The Board also approved the addition of KAPA to the list of approved Charities Projects for consideration by the membership at the Charities meeting held in conjunction with the District 12N Convention March 18.

The following change is proposed to add Knoxville Area Project Access (KAPA) to the list of designated charities projects to be supported, and to renumber the remaining paragraphs of this section. This change is being proposed in case changes to funding sources for the KAPA program become necessary.

Article VIII Charities Projects and Grants - Section 3 Designated Charities and Projects

Subparagraph

- 13) Knoxville Area Project Access (KAPA)
- 14) District Governor's Emergency Fund (See Section 4)
- 15) District Discretionary Fund (See Section 5)
- 16) Proceeds from eyeglass recycling will be given to a 501c(3) organization that Provides free or greatly reduced eye exams or glasses to individuals in need of such Services in Lions District 12N.

East Tennessee Lions Eye Bank Request

The East Tennessee Lions Eye Bank was begun by the Lions in the Knoxville area and has been a strong partner in service with the Lions to the citizens of East Tennessee. The staff retrieves donated corneas, processes that tissue and provides it to several eye surgeons for transplant.

The Eye Bank has rented space in the University of Tennessee Hospital and has, thanks to growth and success, outgrown the space. As a result, a building has been purchased in the Karns area. Interestingly, the building is an expansion of a home that was owned by PDG Bill Shannon, a long-time member of the Karns Lions Club.

Now the Eye Bank needs help from the Lions of District 12-N to make this facility "state of the art" so that the citizens of East Tennessee can continue to receive the best vision care available. The Eye Bank will keep the lab space at UT Hospital as the majority of donors come from UT and the doctors find the convenience a positive factor.

LVBI (LIONS VOLUNTEER BLIND INDUSTRIES) - FLOOD

During our Christmas shutdown period, we experienced a water pipe burst and sprinkler line leak. It was found on Christmas Day and we were able to get a company in that day to help dry up the water with fans and dehumidifiers, drying process took 4 days. The water leak was on the second story of the old building that is constructed of all wood. There was enough water that it was pouring through the wood subfloor and it looked like it was raining on the first floor. The water was turned off that day and the leaks were fixed later in that week. We did received damage from the water; mattress raw material, one office area furniture and CVT flooring are some of the current items. The paint on the wood ceiling is now peeling and flacking in many areas.


We have identified \$55K in raw materials that were damaged, and will be getting quotes for repairs on the other items. Servpro came yesterday and used devices to see if there is water trapped in between the subfloor and they identified some areas. They will be back again today to conduct more in-depth testing. 



REMINDER - LCI DUES INCREASE

The Lions Clubs International Board of Directors undertook an extensive review of Lions Clubs International's financials, including the implementation of substantial budget reductions. After much consideration, the board proposed to adjust dues \$7 over a three-year period.

Under the proposal, international dues to the clubs would be adjusted according to the following schedule:

- \$3 increase on July 1, 2023
- \$2 increase on July 1, 2024
- \$2 increase on July 1, 2025

We realize the association has been reluctant to adjust dues over the years, and we have not adjusted international dues since 2011. The proposed adjustment will help cover our costs and allow us to suitably serve our members' needs. With that said, the Board of Directors did not take this issue lightly, nor are we minimizing the value of each dollar that our members contribute.

A dues adjustment will allow Lions Clubs International to provide improved support to Lions and to continue to invest in improving programs and digital products such as our website and MyLion. It will also allow us to invest in new programs such as the Learning Management System (LMS), development of new curriculum such as digital literacy, training videos, global advertising, marketing automation, digital and video storytelling and other tools and initiatives that will enhance our impact, our brand, and our membership.

I hope that you will see adjustment as an investment in the future of Lions. Through your support, we can ensure that Lions are positioned for success in the future.


