Plastic Recycling Project

Knoxville Tri-County Lions has been taking care of our recycling program for a few months now. They have collected over 1356 pounds of plastic from resources like fellow Lions Clubs and other businesses and individuals. The first bench for Children's Hospital is here and will be scheduling an installation date soon. We are waiting on the Lions plaque before setting a date. The second bench will be going to Sunset Gap as Niswongers Children's Hospital is still under construction issues at this time. Karns Lions Club has asked to be placed on the list as well. Please let me know if you have an interest in obtaining one and where it will be going. It takes 1,000 pounds of plastic per bench!

Plastic grocery bags, ice bags, shrink wrap, plastic wrap, Ziploc bags, dry cleaning bags, news paper sleeves, air pillows, bubble wrap, plastic shipping envelopes, overwrap from cases of food, paper towels, water etc., plastic must be clean and no food debris. Try to please put them into a clear garbage bag so that the store can see that it is not trash. If your plastic won't fit in their receptacle, please notify an employee that you just dropped off a large bag(s) so that they can get it to the back where they store it until the company they use picks it up or they deliver it to the next drop off point for them.

The company for the benches are working with us to get around the only 1 bench per year, so we can do as many as possible. Reach out to your neighbors, church etc. This keeps the plastic out of the landfills. We need your photo of your bag(s), weight, store and city. We do not need the street address. DG Keltie attended a combined meeting of the Morristown Morris Boulevard and the Morristown Cherokee Lions Clubs.






Monarch Chevron Award

East TN Lions Eye Bank Update

On behalf of the East Tennessee Lions Eye Bank (ETLEB) Board of Directors, I want to thank the Lions of District 12-N for your support through Lions District 12-N Charities. In our request for funds for the 2025-2026 Lions Year, we provided the Lions District 12-N Charities Board of Directors proposed use and impact for the funds for their consideration in making a recommendation to the delegates at the convention for \$1,000. A summary follows for all Lions' awareness:

- The ETLEB Board proposed to designate the funds to be applied to the Eye Bank's Special Services account, which supports Lions Clubs throughout District 12-N by filling a gap in providing funds for eye procedures and services that individual Lions Clubs cannot afford and are not covered by other programs such as Knoxville Area Project Access (KAPA).
- To fund the Special Services account, the ETLEB Board has dedicated the annual interest earned from a Certificate of Deposit (CD) valued at approximately \$100,000. Future funds are largely dependent upon the market rate for CDs when it is reinvested after maturing each year, and the Lions District 12-N Charities support of this program can help sustain the service the Eye Bank makes available.
- The actual number of people served through the ETLEB Special Services Committee is dependent upon requests that come from District 12-N Lions Clubs. In the last few years, the Committee has approved requests/referrals from District 12-N Lions Clubs that amount to several thousand dollars. These include assistance with or full payment of: deductibles and/or co-pays for eye services (i.e. cataract surgery) with insurance coverage, prosthetic eyes, retina repair surgery, eye exercise low vision services, and specialty hard contact lenses.



Dear District 12N Lions,







History of Lions Volunteer Blind Industries

In 1990 VBI corporate name is changed to Lions Volunteer Blind Industries. Manufacturing begins on sweat pants for the military.

LVBI celebrates its 40th anniversary in 1991. A 12,000 square foot expansion for textiles was made possible by a grant for \$437,000 funded by LVBI and Tennessee department of Rehabilitation Services.

In 1992 sales reached a record high of \$10.7 million dollars.

1993 sees Roy Proffitt retire as Executive Director after 15 years with LVBI in various capacities. Fred Overbay assumes leadership of the organization. LVBI's Rehabilitation center expands again with 5,000 square foot renovation. A work study program in cooperation with Tennessee School for the Blind begins in 1994.

1995 brings changes in government procurement that affects blind priorities in Federal marketplace. Federal government sales drop to ½ of 1992 levels. Navy life preserver covers are added to production.

1996 & 1997 LVBI begins "Let's Do Lunch" capital campaign to raise matching money for LCIF grant to provide renovations to the manufacturing facility. The capital campaign receives \$98,160 from White Cane Day and 12-N Lions Clubs. It's met with \$75,000 match from LCIF.

1998 LVBI initiates annual fundraiser for employment scholarships for blind workers.

1999 "Project Paycheck" receives \$31,800 from Lions and private donations. Commercial bedding is added through government program.


