



DIABETES AWARENESS



PREVENT BLINDNESS: Prevent Diabetes!

World **Diabetes Day** is November 14. That is the global awareness campaign that focuses on Type 2 Diabetes. Two screening programs have been deployed in our District. The Tellico Village club pioneered the blood glucose (or blood sugar) testing process. Another one that Lions in east Tennessee have used to screen over 1,700 people at mobile Appalachian Miles for Smiles health clinics in the last two years is based on the premise that you should:

1) Know your Risk,

2) Know your A1c, and

3) Take the DPP (Diabetes Prevention Program).

The Risk Assessment step uses the American Diabetes Association Prediabetes questionnaire (next page). Answer the questions and see what <u>your</u> score is! That's something we can all do at home, so we have a challenge to the clubs: ask non-diabetic members to complete the ADA form, and count those that do. Clubs with the highest % completion will receive awards/recognition at convention time.

Risk Assessment used at a screening event reduces the number of people that should have blood work done. If a person has a Risk Score of 5 or higher, typically a <u>non-Lion</u> would do an A1c test with one drop of blood, and have a screening result in 3 minutes. The result would indicate if they might be Prediabetic - or Diabetic and not know it!

If the A1c is 5.7 through 6.4, you are Prediabetic and on a path that often leads to Diabetes and its debilitating health issues: **Blindness**, amputations, stroke, heart attack and kidney failure. There's *Good News*, though: Prediabetics can usually reverse that direction and health issues by changing their diet and exercise habits. The Diabetes Prevention Program (DPP) provides a trained *Lifestyle Change Coach* that works with a group over an extended time to help them achieve goals of 5 to 7% weight loss, and more than 150 minutes of exercise a week. 


FRED MILLER OF CLINTON LIONS CLUB AWARDED LEADERSHIP MEDAL FOR 2019–2020

Who are the Lions?

Lions are volunteer members of local clubs where they enjoy fellowship, develop leadership capabilities, and dedicate part of their free time to help those in need all over the world, while making their individual communities a better place in which to live. The clubs are chartered by Lions Clubs International, the world's largest service club organization.

Our Origin

In 1917 a Chicago, Illinois insurance agent named Melvin Jones founded Lions Clubs International to help the less fortunate. The organization was involved in various social projects until the 1925 International Convention when Helen Keller challenged Lions to become "Knights of the Blind in the crusade against darkness." This is still the main focus of Lionism within the local community and around the world. Even with this focus, Lions also meet a variety of other needs that are identified in their communities.

The Lions of Tennessee have worked millions of hours and raised millions of dollars in our communities as we truly live our motto, "WE SERVE."

World Wide Growth

The International Association of Lions Clubs has grown to be the largest service club organization in the world, representing over 46,000 clubs with about 1,360,000 members in 209 countries and geographical areas around the world.

Vision Screening Children - A Major Project of the Tennessee Lions

In addition to the projects described on the other side of this sheet, and the many ways the local clubs serve their communities, the Lions of Tennessee have teamed up with the Department of Ophthalmology at Vanderbilt Children's Hospital with the goal of providing quality eye care for children statewide. Lions Clubs across the state raised over \$4 million for a project that created the Tennessee Lions Eye Center (TLEC) at Vanderbilt Children Hospital, a pediatric ophthalmology center.

From the beginning, an important part of this unique partnership has been the Tennessee Lions Eye Center Outreach Program, the "clinic without walls," a program of free vision screening of young children in their own neighborhoods, with evaluation of the screening and follow-up by professionals at TLEC. Trained Lions members screen children from 12 months to 72 months of age in their own neighborhoods to detect eye disorders that can lead to serious eye problems and/or blindness at an early age when treatment is most effective. The process is noninvasive which makes it ideal for use with young children. Vision screenings are evaluated by Vanderbilt physicians, and those who have potential eye problems are referred to ophthalmologists or optometrists in their local area for a more detailed examination.

Membership

Any person of legal majority, good moral character and good reputation in his or her community may be granted membership in a chartered Lions Club. If there were more of us, we could help more people!

A state-operated school for visually impaired children located near Nashville providing educational opportunities through 12th grade. Lions fund the Boy and Girl Scout troops and provide \$50.00 for each student at Christmas.

Tennessee School for the Deaf

A state-operated school for children with hearing impairments located in Knoxville providing educational opportunities through 12th grade. Lions help fund personal needs for some students and the summer camp programs that are not state funded.

The Hearing & Speech Foundation

Empowering individuals with communication deficits to live their lives to the fullest by giving children and adults the gift of sound through hearing aids and services.

World Services for the Blind

A comprehensive rehabilitation center for blind adults that provides counseling for emotional and psychological adjustments to blindness as well as vocational training.

TELLICO VILLAGE LIONS SUCESSFULLY STAGE THEIR 15TH ANNUAL OKTOBERFEST

Although requiring considerable modification in order to protect attendees fromCOVID-19, the TV Lions were able to attract a sufficiently large crowd to make the 15th annual fall event a success. Staged at the Tellico Village Yacht Club, the fest normally attracts about 550 residents who gather around large tables and enjoy the German food, beer and wine and socialize with friends and neighbors while listening to German music. This year, because of the pandemic the format was considerably altered.

The major change was in limiting physical attendance at the club to 200 people. The other was serving the food to each person in a closed container rather than using the normal buffet line. The other change was to increase the number of people serving food, with a take-out option. Between the two serving methods approximately 450 people were served.

The TV Lions were fortunate that this was the second fund-raiser they were able to hold this Fall. The first was their Golf-for-Sight Outing. Between these two events sufficient funds were raised for the club to continue a number of service projects, the largest of which was their free eye examination and eyeglass project conducted monthly at the Good Samaritan Center in Lenoir City and Good Shepherd center in Madisonville. These efforts serve over 200 indigent residents per year at an annual cost of about \$25,000.

So, in spite of the challenges posed by the COVID pandemic, the TV Lions are able to maintain both their fundraising and service operations and continue to serve local residents, executing the Lions motto of "WE SERVE."





Lions Volunteer Blind Industries

Since June 4, 2012, Lions Volunteer Blind Industries, Inc. has maintained an Annual Employment Scholarship Giving Program: called: **PROJECT PAYCHECK.**

While many of our blind workers meet or exceed expected job standards, there are others who strive daily to meet those goals in spite of disabilities. LVBI's "Project Paycheck" giving program helps those workers through an Employment Scholarship, which pays each worker A competitive wage as they learn to earn.

Lions Volunteer Blind Industries must remain competitive in the market place. However, we have accepted the added challenge of providing equality in employment opportunities for our blind citizens.

The cost of the Employment Scholarship program continues to rise. The cost of supporting this program is \$300,000. - \$500,000, depending on levels of blind employment. Approximately 25% annually coming from sponsoring Lions Clubs and the balance of donations and our own operating income.

As a business partner with LVBI, you can take advantage of an opportunity to strengthen our relationship, and at the same time, take advantage of tax benefits through your contribution. Lions Volunteer Blind Industries is a 501 (C) 3 not-for-profit organization, and as such, all donations are tax-deductible. 


