

The device only cost about \$30 on Amazon and is highly recommended as a must have for all of us because you never know when a disaster might strike and communication is of utmost importance.



Dear Leader Dog Community,

On September 5, the U.S. Department of Education eliminated all three national Braille Training Grants under the 235E Demonstration Program. This decision directly affects Leader Dog clients and the future of braille literacy and the independence of people who are blind, DeafBlind or low vision — including many individuals we serve. Without these programs:

Fewer professionals will be trained to teach braille.

Adults and children will lose access to essential literacy tools.

The braille literacy crisis will deepen across all age groups.

How You Can Help:

Please call your U.S. Senators and urge them to take action. Find contact info.

Key talking points you can use:

Braille is literacy. Without it, people lose access to education, employment, and independence.

This is not a budget issue—it's a policy decision that eliminates all federal braille training programs.



Lions Mental Health and Wellbeing Service Ideas

- Mindfulness Colouring for Playgroups, Community centres, or Libraries
- Give out flower stems or cupcakes outside Train/ Bus stations
- "Pause & Breathe" Moments: Share simple breathing videos or tips on social media
- Stress Relief Kits: assemble & distribute small kits (tea, stress ball, affirmations)
- Mental Health First Aid Training: Invite a local professional for a Zoom workshop.
- Chalk the Walk/Kindness Rocks: Lions and Leos with local people draw uplifting messages in chalk on driveways, pavements or on stones
- Mindfulness Walk: Organize a community walk focusing on reflection & gratitude.
- Positive Post-It Day: Place kind messages in public spaces, schools, care homes
- Support Circle Café: 30-min online "coffee chat" on mental health
 no therapy, just connection
- Wear Green Day: Simple awareness campaign—wear green and explain why- it's for mental health awareness.
- Senior Story/Music Time: Call or visit the elderly to listen to or read their favourite stories or listen to their favourite music.
- Gratitude Tree: Invite community members to write things they're grateful for on leaves to hang on an artificial tree.

PROJECT IDEAS FOR VISION

ACT // BEGINNER

- Collect used eyeglasses and send them to the nearest Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center.
- Organize a braille, large print and audio book collection to benefit a local school, library or senior center.
- Volunteer to create audio recordings of books and periodicals for people who are blind.
- Invite an eye professional to your club to educate Lions on common eye diseases that may cause blindness if left untreated.
- Invite a person who is blind or has low vision to talk about technology that aids in mobility or navigation and activities of daily living.

ACT // INTERMEDIATE

- Work with local eye care professionals to provide a wide variety of community screenings including early childhood, school and all age's vision screenings.
- Sponsor a World Sight Day event.
- Sponsor visually impaired students through camps, contests or other activities.
- Develop a directory of community resources and services available for people who are blind or have low vision.
- Organize an inclusive sporting event for children with and without visual impairment.
- Host a fundraiser to purchase and donate white canes to people who are blind or visually impaired in your community.
- Host a public event to promote healthy vision and increase awareness of common eye diseases that can cause vision loss.

ACT // ADVANCED

- Work with local employers to develop an employee vision screening program.
- Host a "Beep Baseball" game or tournament.
- Support a guide dog training program through fundraising or voluntary labor.
- Develop an assistive technology library so people who have vision impairment can access resources as their needs change.
- Create a sensory garden with plants, water features, and sculptures that engage the senses of touch, smell, hearing and taste. Provide braille or audio recordings of signage.
- Partner with an orientation and mobility specialist to provide ongoing support to teachers of inclusive classrooms and and employers of inclusive workplaces.

Information on State Convention 2026



There has been a change in the location of the 2026 Tennessee Lions State Convention. It will now be in Clarksville at the **Doubletree by Hilton, Clarksville Riverview**. The room cost is \$139 plus tax which includes a breakfast buffet (at a value of \$21 per person). Reservations can be made at:

The convention will kickoff on Thursday, April 30th from 6-9 PM with a reception for our International Guest, **1st International Vice President Mark Lyon.** Light finger foods will be available and are included in the registration package price.

The Full Registration package is all that is available at the present time. This includes Lunch and Dinner on Friday, in addition to Lunch and a Grand Banquet on Saturday evening. The cost is \$150 for four meals and the Thursday reception.

There will be optional seminars on Friday morning, with great speakers scheduled throughout the day on Friday and Saturday.

There will be a **live basket auction on Friday night** with Ed Cope conducting the auction. The baskets will be provided by Lions and Lions Clubs with a value of at least \$50 to make the auction productive. Your support is very much appreciated. Clubs and individuals are encouraged to donate items for this auction.

Special entertainment will be provided by Chris Golden, son of William Lee Golden of the Oak Ridge Boys.
